Increase preschool enrollement from 30% to the national average

Children succeed in school

By 2010 all children will be ready for school

By 2010 our state will be the best in the country

Percent of children fully ready for school (per work sampling)

Lack of affordable high quality child care

Percent reading at grade level in the 3rd grade

High rate of poverty among children not ready for school

In 1990, 20% of children were enrolled in preschool

Many parents don't read to their children

In 2000, 40% of children were deemed fully ready for school

Children eligible for Medicaid are not enrolled

Inadequate nutrition for pregnant mothers and young children

Children of teen parents are more likely to be unready for school
